LETTER FROM THE FOUNDER

Dear Ambassadors for Hope,

Sierra Leone emerged from a decade of civil war in 2002, with the help of Britain, the former colonial power, and a large United Nations peacekeeping mission. A lasting feature of the war, in which tens of thousands died, was the atrocities committed by the rebels, whose trademark was to cut off the hands or feet of their victims. The country, and its citizens, are now scrambling to rebuild their lives amidst broken infrastructures for health, education, and roads. Despite being endowed with significant natural resources, Sierra Leone is one of the poorest countries in the world with about 75% of the population living below the poverty line of US\$2.00/day, with a ranking of 180 out of 187 countries on the 2011 United Nations Human Development Index.

Education for Hope (EFH) was founded in 2010 with a strong vision of the future for the country of Sierra Leone, one where all children have access to basic educational resources, including books, school supplies, and safe and healthy learning environments. Our vision is based on the shared belief among our friends, supporters, and colleagues that education is a *fundamental human right*.

In our first year of operation, EFH shipped 25,000 books to Sierra Leone through the Sierra Leone Library Board. These books were distributed to libraries across the country, making it accessible to the general public and children. We continued that strong start with the rebuilding of Ro Tumba Primary School in Ro Tumba Village in 2011 under one of our core programming, *Rebuilding Dilapidated Schools*.

2011 was a break-out year for EFH, with our first fundraiser at Bus Boys and Poets, Get to Know EFH that introduced our small organization to the African Diaspora community in Washington, DC. From this event, EFH was able to raise the much needed funds to start the re-building of Ro Tumba Primary School, recruit additional board members, and form a strong team of staff based in the U.S. and Sierra Leone who are committed to the growth of EFH.

Our goals for 2012 are to send more books to Sierra Leone, rebuild additional schools, and send more backpacks filled with school supplies for the beginning of the school year 2012-2013. Additionally, we plan on supporting secondary schools, local and national colleges and universities in Sierra Leone.

We could not have done all this and more without your support. Your financial support is critical to ensuring that EFH can fulfill its mission of improving the quality of life by ending generational cycles of poverty for millions of children in Sierra Leone by empowering them with the tools and resources to be able to read and write, and thus have the ability to chart their own destinies.

VISION STATEMENT

Our vision is that within two decades, all children will have access to basic education in Sierra Leone.

2 | CORE PROGRAMMING OF EDUCATION FOR HOPE

Education for Hope is currently pursuing its mission through three distinct programs:

REBUILDING DILAPIDATED SCHOOLS (RDS)

The overall objective of this program is to create a learning environment that is conducive to learning by identifying schools that are in dire need of structural repair and provide the resources, tools, and manpower to ameliorate the devastating conditions. One current project in this program is underway in the village of Ro Tumba.


BOOKS FOR LIBRARIES (BFL)

This program is designed to provide books to libraries that either lack books or have outdated textbooks. The BFL program's main objective is to equip libraries with books and help them create an efficient program to manage and loan books to those in need.

EDUCATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP DRIVE (ESD)

This program is designed to recognize and assist academically distinguished, financially needy students in primary schools. The ESD program will provide essential resources to students in Sierra Leone who are in dire need.

One year later, Education for Hope has taken the first big steps toward realizing our vision and getting our mission underway. And while some of these steps and accomplishments may have been modest, all of them are crucial to our work and to the basic foundation on which we will build our future success.

3 | HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2010-2011 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

ADMINISTRATIVE SUCCESS

Behind the scenes of any important and worthwhile undertaking, we find the dedication and hard work that goes into the less than celebrated detail work and administrative minutia. This past year, many dedicated staff and volunteers helped with such important tasks as drafting bylaws, ensuring compliance with all legal standards and procedures, maintaining our status as a 501(c)(3) organization, as well as establishing coordinating bodies to help with these tasks.

Today, as much as ever, maintaining positive exposure and relevance to the public in order to continue to grow our community of supporters requires smart marketing and use of social media. This past year brought important improvement and growth not only to our online and social media presence, but to our face-to-face interaction with the public as well. Having refined our 'elevator pitch', staff and volunteers are now better equipped to effectively promote our work to prospective supporters and organizations. Our Facebook and Twitter presence has grown, and we created our own YouTube channel with a video that introduces our organization. We also re-designed and built a brand new website using the Drupal platform. Our logo and marketing and correspondence materials have all been professionalized as well.

BUS BOYS AND POETS FUNDRAISER

Our first fundraiser at Bus Boys and Poets in the famous U Street Corridor in Washington, DC raised well over \$1,000. We were fortunate enough to have Salifu Kamara, an advocate for the voiceless and a rebel war survivor in Sierra Leone serve as keynote speaker for the event. His passionate plea for support for our work in Sierra Leone certainly led to the success of the evening. In addition, we were able to recruit more volunteers at the event.

RO TUMBA SCHOOL PROJECT AND THE BOOKS FOR LIBRARIES PROGRAM

Both the Ro Tumba School Project and the Books for Libraries Program are a clear demonstration of the power of hope. Ro Tumba village is a small subsistence farming village that has pulled its extremely limited resources together to make real and notable progress toward constructing a safe and sound school house for their children with the financial support of Education for Hope. When it comes to understanding the specific needs of communities and assessing resources and capacity, there is no substitute for meeting face to face with members and leaders of the community and seeing and experiencing first-hand the difference that our programs can make, learning from those we serve how best to serve them.

PARTNERSHIP AND COLLABORATION

Education for Hope sees the indispensable value in partnerships and in collaboration. We partnered and developed affiliations with such governmental and nongovernmental organizations such as Books for Goodwill International, Peace Corps, and the Sierra Leone Library Board.

4.1 DIVERSIFIED FUNDING

Learning to grow and adapt to today's acutely competitive fundraising market, we here at Education for Hope understand and appreciate the need for diversified funding streams and are currently undergoing the application process for a number of public and private grants including; the Combined Federal Giving Program, Google grant, Friends of Sierra Leone grant, and the Guidestar Certification. An important strength and advantage which Education for Hope brings to this process is a level of personal experience and involvement on the ground with the children, families, and communities of Sierra Leone.


NOTES

7 | HOW YOU CAN HELP

Every contribution that you make brings hope to a child in Sierra Leone and breaks the cycle of poverty.
